

Dickinson College Exit Poll

Fall 2016

Methodology

Number of Interviews: 482 Voters in Cumberland County, Pennsylvania. Several questions were asked of less than the full sample of respondents. Smaller numbers of respondents will be noted next to relevant questions.

Margin of Error: +/- 4.6% at a 95% level of confidence. Smaller sample sizes have larger margins of error.

Date: November 8, 2016

Methods of Interviewing: All interviews were conducted in person, but were anonymous. Upon exiting the polling place, voters were asked if they wanted to participate. If voters agreed, they were given a clipboard with the survey and asked to complete both sides of the questionnaire. Upon completion, surveys were placed in envelopes with precinct identifiers.

Weighting: Data were weighted by the final vote percentage (Democrat and Republican) of Cumberland County in the Presidential race. Individuals who reported voting for someone other than Clinton or Trump, or not voting at all in the presidential contest were weighted at 1.00.

The exit poll was conducted by students enrolled in Dickinson College Political Science classes POSC 239: Research Methods, and POSC 390: Campaigns and Elections Senior Seminar, under the direction of Professor Sarah Niebler.
